SECTION 2

Command, Operations, and Training

Major emphasis was placed upon the development of new and improvement of existing Training Facilities in support of the Fleet Marine Force.

Marine Corps Base continued to provide maximum support to Fleet Marine Force commands, as well as organic units, relative to weapons requalification. 31,113 Marines and sailors requalified with both the M16A1/M16A2 service rifle and the M1911A1 service pistol.

The Inspector General of the Marine Corps conducted inspections of Marine Corps Base and found the base capable of accomplishing the assigned missions.

Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) responded to 96 calls, 83 on Base and 13 off Base, and 13 bomb threats. Additionally, several VIP visits were supported as well as numerous routine requests for EOD assistance, i.e., target emplacement down range, escorting personnel down range for controlled burns, endangered species, etc.


The Navy Boat Crew conducted 167 boat runs and logged over 1,595 manhours in support of training.

The NBC/CS Chamber section trained 19,283 personnel. Construction on the new equipment decontamination station, personnel decontamination station and outdoor classroom was started and is scheduled to be completed within the near future.

The use of prisoner and awardee work details saved the Marine Corps an estimated \$450,000. 2,299 prisoners were confined and 2,084 prisoners were released from the Brig. 522 awardees were processed through the Correctional Custody Unit (CCU).

The Field Operations Branch of the Provost Marshal's Office conducted six safety fairs for base and tenant commands. These fairs were initiated in November 1986 and designed to make Marines and sailors more safety conscious by providing them with a sample of hands-on experience and information directly related to vehicle safety.

As a result of mutual effort between Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune and the State of North Carolina, a North Carolina Drivers License Office was opened in building 4023, Midway Park during 1986. This action was initiated to assist the active duty military, dependents, retirees and civilian employees aboard Base as well as non-military affiliated civilians of Onslow County by having this second office located on this side of the county.



Personnel and Administration

Processed a total of 370 administrative discharges; 224 honorable, 31 general, 93 under other than honorable conditions, 12 entry level and 10 retained.

On 2 February 1986 the Industrial Area II Enlisted Club was closed permanently as an economy measure to increase the profitability of the Base Club System.


Civic Action

Rifle Range Detachment hosted the North American Hunters Education Championships for approximately 300 civilian teenagers. The championships were conducted by the National Rifle Association and the North Carolina Hunters Safety Association. Several training areas and ranges were provided, as well as logistical support such as messing and billeting.

The Provost Marshal's Office participated in Law Enforcement Day at the Jacksonville Mall, Jacksonville, North Carolina, with a static display of military police equipment.

The Beirut Memorial was officially dedicated at a ceremony held at Camp Johnson in memory of the 271 brave men who died in the cause of peace. An addition to the memorial, a statue is planned...a statue of a lone Marine, keeping a vigil over his fellow comrades. Participating in the dedication were the Honorable A. D. (Zander) Guy, Mayor of Jacksonville, North Carolina (Mayor's Welcome); The Honorable James G. Martin, Governor, State of North Carolina (Governor's Address); General Paul X. Kelly, Commandant, United States Marine Corps (Dedication Address); and Colonel Timothy J. Geraghty, United States Marine Corps (Retired), (Dedication of the Beirut Memorial).



Sequential Listing of Events

- 4-30 January 1986 Range Maintenance constructed observation tower on Gillette and Weil Points for safety of New River waterway.
- 6 January 1986 Renovation of 699 Lanham Act (Midway Park) housing units was completed bringing these units up to adequate status.
- 29 January 1986 Hosted East Coast Regional Men's Basketball Championship.
- 2 February 1986 The Computer Assisted Retrieval System (CAR) became operational in the Base Disbursing Fiscal Section.
- 12 February 1986 Governor's Advisory Committee on Military Affairs met in Raleigh, North Carolina. Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, in attendance.
- 12-28 February 1986 Installation and rewiring of an 18 target pop-up system to include overhead lines and control boxes for all units.
- 17-21 February 1986 Hosted All-Marine Boxing Championship.
- 25 February 1986 Crisis Management Exercise conducted.
- 12-21 March 1986 Hosted East Coast Regional Men's Volleyball Double Elimination Tournament.
- 28-30 March 1986 Hosted Intercollegiate Golf Tournament at Paradise Point Gold Course.
- 2 April 1986 General P. X. Kelley, Commandant of the Marine Corps visited Camp Lejeune, touring the various K-ranges to observe Marines training.
- 13-18 April 1986 Hosted East Coast Regional Bowling Championship.
- 17 April - 4 June 1986 1986 Navy Relief Fund Drive raised \$350,000 under Staff Judge Advocate cognizance. Goal was 100% contact, which was exceeded.



18 April 1986 Coordination and support was provided for the spring Special Olympics Track meet held on the athletic field of the Camp Lejeune Dependents' Schools.

15 May 1986 Infantry Training School unit on G-5 reported an 81mm mortar tube explosion. Seven casualties reported including five wounded and two dead.

22 May 1986 The Lejeune High School Annual Scholars' Banquet was held to honor Lejeune High School scholars.

23 May 1986 Mess Attendant Contract awarded to Moore's Cafeteria of San Antonio, Texas for Camp Geiger. This was the first messhall to be contracted out for the Marine Corps.

3-19 June 1986 Inspection of Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune by the Inspector General of the Marine Corps (IGMC).


13 June 1986 Messhall 1209 was announced as winner of the Ney Award for "Best Consolidated Mess, United States Marine Corps."

16 - 27 June 1986 The Regional Automated Services Center, Camp Lejeune implemented the school version of the Supported Activities Supply System (SASSY) in support of the Marine Corps Service Support Schools. This enabled the Marine Corps Service Support Schools to teach the most current Class I software provided under the umbrella of the Marine Corps Standard Supply System.

2-12 July 1986 Hosted East Coast Regional Men's Softball Championship.

19 August 1986 Prisoner Apprenticeship Cook and Baker Program approved by U. S. Department of Labor and Headquarters Marine Corps and instituted at the Brig.

23 October 1986 Base Maintenance cut ditches around gates on highway 172, highway 24 and highway 17 to maintain security on base training area.



- 1-2 November 1986 Mobilization Operational Readiness Deployment Test 87 was conducted with Third Battalion, Twenty-fourth Marines, Saint Louis, Missouri participating.
- 4 December 1986 The Joint Interservice Resource Study Group (JIRSG) SE-14, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina published a Study of Calibration of Precision Measuring Equipment. This study documents annual savings to DoD of \$302,427 through increased inter/intraservicing.
- 10 December 1986 Media representatives attended a press conference on land acquisition hosted by Major General J. Edward Cassity, Commanding General, Marine Corps Base.
- 22 December 1986 Major General J. Edward Cassity, Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, and Major General Dennis J. Murphy, Commanding General, Second Marine Division, Fleet Marine Force, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, signed Memorandum of Agreement for the consolidation of education services.
