From January 2025 through the present, I have served as an attorney in the White House Counsel's Office. I provide legal advice to the President and White House officials on litigation, executive orders, legislation, federal regulatory actions, and nominations. As an attorney in the White House, I provide advice on some of the most complex and novel legal issues facing our Nation.

Before joining the White House, I practiced law at Cooper & Kirk, PLLC from 2024 to 2025. There my practice involved three main areas. First, a substantial portion of my practice involved litigation and other efforts to protect individuals' civil rights—including through class actions, individual employment discrimination cases, and warning letters. Second, I represented state governments in complex or high-stakes litigation. Third, I represented individual corporate clients in complex business disputes.

From 2022 to 2024, I practiced law at Gibson, Dunn & Crutcher LLP. There I had a general litigation practice. I represented companies and individuals in complex business, partnership, and bankruptcy disputes. I also provided regulatory counseling to public companies. In the course of my pro bono work, I represented a religious non-profit organization facing investigation from a state attorney general.

From 2018 to 2019, I practiced law at Consovoy McCarthy Park PLLC (now Consovoy McCarthy PLLC). My practice focused on civil rights and constitutional litigation, though I also handled administrative law matters and business disputes. I represented non-profits, large businesses, government entities, and individuals.

In the summer and fall of 2018, I served as a law clerk for Chairman Charles E. Grassley on the Senate Judiciary Committee. I provided assistance during all aspects of Justice Kavanaugh's Supreme Court confirmation hearings, including by conducting research and preparing memoranda.

As noted above, my career has been spent primarily as a general litigator handling complex commercial, statutory, and constitutional disputes. Over time, I have developed a specialty in civil rights and constitutional litigation, though throughout my career I have remained a generalist. My typical clients include individuals, non-profit organizations, government entities, and businesses.

I estimate that 95% of my private practice involved litigation. I frequently entered appearances in court to file complaints, dispositive motions, discovery motions, pre-trial motions, and appellate briefs. I occasionally appeared in court to assist with trial or other proceedings. I frequently took and defended depositions.

1. *Brigida v. U.S. Dep't of Transportation*, 1:16-cv-2227 (D.D.C.) (Friedrich, J.) (Representation: 2024 – 2025)

I represented a class of individuals who applied to become air traffic controllers and alleged they were denied employment because the FAA placed race above merit in its 2014 hiring process,

including by adopting a racially discriminatory “biographical assessment” in violation of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. I deposed approximately eight to ten witnesses, worked extensively with experts, handled discovery disputes, and assisted with all aspects of pre-trial strategy. The district court granted the parties’ joint motion to stay the case in March 2025; public filings indicate that the parties have made “significant progress” toward settlement.

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2. *X Corp. v. Center for Countering Digital Hate, Inc.*, No. 24-2643 (9th Cir.)
(Representation: 2024 – 2025)

X Corp. alleged that the defendants violated the Computer Fraud and Abuse Act and breached X's terms of service by engaging in unauthorized data scraping. The district court dismissed the case, and X Corp. appealed to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. I represented X Corp. on appeal and helped brief the case. Briefing was complete in November 2024. Oral argument is scheduled for September 2026. The Ninth Circuit has not yet announced the judges on the argument panel.

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3. *Kascsak v. Expedia*, No. 1:23-cv-01373 (W.D. Tex.) (Ezra, and Pitman, JJ.)
(Representation: 2024 – 2025)

I represented an individual who alleged that he was verbally offered a senior position at a company, that the company reopened its hiring process for the purpose of hiring a more diverse candidate, and that the company ultimately declined to hire him because of his race and sex, in violation of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. I was part of the team retained to represent the plaintiff once the case advanced past a motion to dismiss. During the course of this representation, I was heavily involved in pre-trial discovery efforts. The case settled in March 2025.

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4. *Johnson v. Univ. of Oklahoma*, No. 5:24-cv-00495 (W.D. Okla.) (Wyrick, J.)
(Representation: 2024 – 2025)

I represented a putative class of University of Oklahoma students who alleged that the University discriminated on the basis of race when awarding financial aid, in violation of Title VI and the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment. I played a key role in preparing the class action for filing, including drafting the complaint and working with experts. I was also the primary drafter of our response in opposition to the University of Oklahoma's motion to dismiss. The case remains pending in the Western District of Oklahoma.

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5. *Floridians Protecting Freedom, Inc. v. Ladapo*, No. 4:24-cv-419, 754 F. Supp. 3d 1165
(N.D. Fla. 2024) (Walker, J.) (Representation: 2024)

I represented the State of Florida in connection with a 2024 ballot referendum. When Floridians

Protecting Freedom, Inc. (FPF) began airing advertisements that the State alleged contained objectively false information about the availability of emergency medical services under Florida law, the State threatened to take legal action. FPF then sued, alleging First Amendment violations. I served as outside defense counsel for the State of Florida. The district court entered a temporary restraining order, which it extended for two weeks. I then drafted a brief opposing preliminary injunctive relief. The district court ultimately denied FPF's motion for a preliminary injunction and dissolved the temporary restraining order. After this occurred, FPF dismissed its suit with prejudice.

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6. *In re Serta Simmons Bedding, LLC*, Nos. 4:23-AP-9001, 4:23-BK-90020, 2023 WL 3855820 (Bankr. S.D. Tex. June 6, 2023) (Jones, J.), *rev'd*, 125 F.4th 555 (5th Cir. 2024) (Representation: 2023)

This case was part of the bankruptcy of Serta Simmons Bedding. Prior to the bankruptcy, two rival groups of creditors proposed “up-tiering” debt transactions, whereby their group’s debt would increase in payment priority, in exchange for a significant reduction in the amount owed. One group of creditors prevailed (the Priority Lenders) and entered into a transaction with Serta Simmons. The other group of creditors was excluded from the transaction (the Excluded Lenders). After Serta Simmons filed for bankruptcy, the Excluded Lenders sued Serta Simmons and the Priority Lenders in a bankruptcy adversary proceeding.

I represented the Priority Lenders and was a member of the trial team, second-chairing for our lead attorney in the adversary proceeding. I was also heavily involved in depositions and discovery. After a bench trial, the bankruptcy court entered judgment in favor of our clients. The bankruptcy court’s judgment was later reversed on appeal. I was not involved in the appellate proceedings.

This multi-billion-dollar bankruptcy action involved more than 100 parties and an extremely large number of attorneys. Accordingly, I am listing all co-counsel with whom I personally recall working, as well as the individuals who appear to have served as lead counsel for the primary parties in the bankruptcy court’s adversary proceeding. A full listing of all counsel is available on the bankruptcy court’s docket.

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7. *Students for Fair Admissions v. Harvard*, No. 1:14-cv-14176, 397 F. Supp. 3d 126 (D. Mass. 2019) (Burroughs, J.), *aff'd*, 980 F.3d 157 (1st Cir. 2020), *rev'd*, 600 U.S. 181 (2023) (Representation: 2018 – 2019)

This case involved a challenge to Harvard's affirmative action policies under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act. I assisted with discovery matters in advance of trial and was involved in summary judgment briefing and pre-trial proceedings. During the trial, I provided legal support

for the trial team. The district court ruled against our client. The United States Court of Appeals for the First Circuit affirmed. But the United States Supreme Court reversed and held that Harvard had illegally discriminated on the basis of race, in violation of Title VI. My involvement was limited to the district court proceedings.

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8. *Tate v. United States*, 890 F.3d 697 (8th Cir. 2018), *cert. denied*, 586 U.S. 1222 (2019) (No. 18-601) (Representation: 2018 – 2019)

This case involved the criminal prosecution of John Tate, who managed Ron Paul's 2012 Presidential Campaign. Prosecutors alleged that Tate misstated the purpose of certain expenditures in campaign finance filings. A jury convicted Tate under the federal obstruction and false-statement statutes. The United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit affirmed. I was part of the team retained to represent Tate in his Supreme Court proceedings. I drafted a petition for certiorari and reply in support of certiorari. The Supreme Court declined to hear the case. In 2020, Mr. Tate received a full and unconditional pardon.

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9. *Montana v. Tipton*, 421 P.3d 780 (Mont. S. Ct. 2018), *cert. denied*, 586 U.S. 1145 (2019) (No. 18-444) (Representation: 2018 – 2019)

This case involved a Montana law, which permitted prosecutions within one year of a suspect's DNA identification even if a limitations period had otherwise expired. Montana prosecutors solved the cold-case rape of a child. They brought a prosecution under this law. The Montana Supreme Court held that the Constitution's Ex Post Facto Clause barred the prosecution. Montana filed a petition for writ of certiorari in the United States Supreme Court. I represented the National District Attorneys Association and filed an amicus brief in support of Montana's position. The brief argued that the Montana Supreme Court's decision was inconsistent with the original public meaning of the Ex Post Facto Clause. The Supreme Court called for a response, but ultimately denied certiorari.

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10. *McDonald v. Sorrels*, No. 1:19-cv-219, 2020 WL 3261061 (W.D. Tex. May 29, 2020) (Yeakel, J.), *rev'd sub nom. McDonald v. Longley*, 4 F.4th 229 (5th Cir. 2021) (Representation: 2019)

I represented three individuals in a First Amendment challenge to the State Bar of Texas's compelled collection of mandatory bar dues, allegedly inadequate opt-out procedures, and spending on political and ideological activities. I drafted the complaint, motion for preliminary injunction, and motion for partial summary judgment. I also compiled the stipulated evidentiary record. The district court ruled against our clients, but the Fifth Circuit reversed. I was not involved in the appellate proceedings.

This practice is dynamic. It requires providing legal advice on new and varied topics each and every day.

I have never acted or registered as a lobbyist.

During portions of my career, I have worked in government positions in which I was prohibited from engaging in the private practice of law for non-government clients. When engaged in the private practice of law, I have dedicated time to pro bono work. For example, I provided pro bono representation to a non-profit religious healthcare clinic facing hostile subpoenas from a state attorney general. The investigation resulted in no adverse findings. I also represented an inmate who alleged that he was denied meals complying with his religiously mandated diet, as well as a prisoner who brought an excessive force claim after being attacked by a police dog in his jail cell. These latter two representations occurred through the Yale Appellate Litigation Project during my time in law school, under Second Circuit Rule 46.1(e). My records are insufficient to determine the amount of time devoted to specific matters. In addition to my pro bono work, I frequently take time to mentor law students and junior attorneys.

Around this time, I spoke with the White House Counsel to discuss potential interest in the position. I then submitted applications to Senators Blackburn and Hagerty on January 9, 2026.

On January 9, 2026, I was invited to interview with Senator Blackburn's Chief Counsel. That interview occurred on January 16, 2026. On January 28, 2026, I was invited to interview with Senator Hagerty's General Counsel. That interview occurred on January 30, 2026. On February 18, 2026, I was invited to interview with Senator Hagerty. That interview occurred on February 26, 2026. On March 4, 2026, I was invited to interview with Senator Blackburn. That interview occurred on March 11, 2026.

On March 30, 2026, I interviewed with attorneys from the White House Counsel's Office. On August 14, 2026, President Trump called to inform me that he had selected me for nomination.

Throughout this process, I have had contact with members of the White House Counsel's

Office and the Justice Department's Office of Legal Policy regarding the nomination and associated paperwork.
