5	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
6	(1) The internet has become a dangerous re-
7	cruiting ground for White supremacy and White na-
8	tionalism.
9	(2) On September 17, 2019, the Washington
10	Post published an article entitled "'Do you have

white teenage sons? Listen up.' How white supremacists are recruiting boys online.".

(3) The article described in paragraph (2) reported the following: "As extremist groups have
grown increasingly visible in the physical world, their
influence over malleable young minds in the digital

(4) According to the Anti-Defamation League in 2019, White supremacists have committed at least 73 murders since a White supremacist murdered protestor Heather Heyer at the 2017 Unite the Right rally in Charlottesville, Virginia, 39 of which were clearly motivated by hateful, racist ideology.

- (5) The murders described in paragraph (4) include deadly White supremacist shooting rampages in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Poway, California, and El Paso, Texas (which was one of the deadliest White supremacist attacks in more than 50 years). In each of these cities, White supremacist murderers acted on the threat embodied by the White supremacist sentiments in Charlottesville.
- (6) After the heinous attack in Charlottesville, President Trump responded by creating a moral

equivalency and a justification for the racist behavior, saying the following: "We condemn in the
strongest possible terms this egregious display of hatred, bigotry, and violence on many sides, on many
sides.".

(7) Chad Wolf, the senior official performing

- (7) Chad Wolf, the senior official performing the duties of the Secretary of Homeland Security, stated during his confirmation hearing before the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the Senate on September 23, 2020, that White supremacists posed "the most persistent and lethal threat when we talk about domestic violent extremists", particularly "from a lethality standpoint over the last 2 years".
- (8) According to a study conducted by The Guardian using data compiled by the nonpartisan Center for Strategic and International Studies, since 2010, White supremacists and other violent right-wing extremists have killed 117 individuals in politically motived attacks in the United States.
- (9) On September 29, 2020, during an exchange at the first presidential debate, moderator Chris Wallace repeatedly asked President Trump if he would condemn White supremacists, but President Trump refused to do so and instead responded

1	by referring to a violent extremist group with White
2	supremacist links, saying "Proud Boys, stand back
3	and stand by", further emboldening, rather than
4	condemning, the group.
