#### b. Describe:

i. the general character of your law practice and indicate by date when its character has changed over the years.

In the Fall of 1985, I was sworn in as an Assistant United States Attorney ("AUSA") in the SDNY and served as an AUSA in the criminal division of that Office for twelve years. While an AUSA, I investigated and prosecuted federal criminal cases as a member of the General Crimes, Narcotics, Major Crimes and White Plains Units. I tried seventeen cases to verdict, which involved charges of murder, racketeering, narcotics distribution, armed robbery, obstruction and police brutality. I also argued nine appeals in the Second Circuit Court of Appeals. From 1994 through 1997, I was the Assistant-In-Charge of the White Plains Office and supervised all federal prosecutions in six New York counties, including cases involving murder, racketeering, organized crime, fraud, public corruption, tax evasion, money laundering, narcotics, child abuse, civil rights and other offenses.

I then entered private practice, first as a partner at Gage & Pavlis, New York, New York from 1997 to 2001, and then as a founding member of Daly & Pavlis, LLC, Southport, CT from 2001 to 2010. Both firms were devoted to corporate and commercial litigation, white collar criminal matters, corporate internal investigations and monitoring, and SEC enforcement actions. My practice focused on federal criminal defense work primarily in the white collar area, internal corporate investigations and monitoring. From 1999 through 2010, I also served as the Independent Monitor for Con Edison Inc., conducting internal investigations of potential environmental, health and ethical violations. I reported to the Chairman of the company. From 2005 through 2009, I also served as an advisor to the New York City Department of Environmental Protection.

In August of 2010, I returned to public service as the First Assistant United States Attorney in the District of Connecticut. On May 13, 2013, United States Attorney David Fein resigned and I became the Acting United States Attorney. In that capacity, I currently oversee the management of the Office and all federal criminal investigations, prosecutions and civil cases in Connecticut. In addition, I have been actively involved in certain criminal cases, including as lead counsel in a recent homicide trial, and co-counsel in the investigation of civil rights violations committed by officers in the East Haven Police Department.

ii. your typical clients and the areas at each period of your legal career, if any, in which you have specialized.

While in private practice from 1997-2010, I generally represented

corporations and businesses as well as officers and employees of corporations, usually in federal criminal investigations. Although I sometimes appeared in court for bail hearings, guilty pleas and sentencing proceedings, much of my practice was devoted to representing individuals who were under investigation, subpoenaed to testify before federal grand juries and/or interviewed by federal prosecutors. Additionally, as a monitor for Con Edison from 1999-2010 and advisor to the NYC Department of Environmental Protection from 2005-2009, I focused on environmental and safety compliance. I did not represent Con Edison or the DEP as counsel, but rather provided the leadership of both organizations with advice concerning the implementation of their environmental and safety programs.

Virtually all of my practice while working in both the public and private sectors has been in litigation. I frequently appeared in federal court in the SDNY when I was an AUSA from 1985-1997. From 8/2010 to the present, initially as First Assistant United States Attorney and currently as Acting United States Attorney in Connecticut, I have appeared in the United States District Court in Connecticut. In sum, while in government service, 100% of my practice was in federal courts.

While in private practice from 1997-2010, I appeared occasionally in federal court in the SDNY, EDNY and District of CT. During that time, I also appeared in Connecticut State Court in two criminal cases, one in Danbury and one in Norwalk, and in one criminal case in New York State Court in Westchester. With respect to private practice, I would estimate that 90% was in federal courts and 10% was in state courts.

I have not appeared in any other courts or before any administrative agencies.

In government service, approximately 85% of my practice has been in criminal proceedings. The remaining 15% generally relates to my oversight and supervision of the Civil Division of the United States Attorney's Office in the District of Connecticut, initially as the FAUSA of that Office and currently as the Acting United States Attorney.

Similarly, in private practice, I would estimate that 85% of my practice was in criminal proceedings and 15% was in civil proceedings.

As a federal prosecutor, I have tried 18 criminal cases to verdict. In all cases, I was either sole counsel, lead counsel or I partnered with another AUSA. All of my trials were before juries.

  - 1) United States v. Hector Natal et al, 3:12 Cr 164 (JBA): The most recent

matter is the *Natal* case, a four-week criminal trial before United States District Court Judge Janet B. Arterton in which two defendants were charged with an arson that resulted in the death of two women and a young boy. I oversaw the grand jury investigation and was the lead prosecutor at trial. The trial began on March 25, 2013 and concluded on April 18, 2013 in federal court in Connecticut. I conducted half of the direct examinations of Government witnesses and the cross examinations of defense witnesses, and delivered two jury addresses, the opening statement and the rebuttal argument. The jury convicted both defendants of all charges including attempted arson, arson resulting in death, narcotics conspiracy and several obstruction counts. The defendants are awaiting sentencing.

2) United States v. John Miller et al, 3:12 CR 17 (AWT): Starting in 2011, as co-counsel with another prosecutor, I conducted the grand jury investigation that resulted in the indictment of four police officers in the East Haven Police Department for various civil rights violations, including allegations of illegal arrests and the use of unreasonable force against members of the community. The indictment charged the defendants with a conspiracy to deprive individuals of their constitutional rights, three counts of use of unreasonable force, three counts of false arrests and three counts of obstruction and was filed on January 12, 2012. The case was assigned to Chief Judge Alvin W. Thompson, United States District Court Judge in Connecticut. Two of the four charged officers, John Miller and Jason Zullo, have pled guilty. The remaining defendants, David Cari and Dennis Spaulding, went to trial in September 2013.

The trial was initially set for a date that conflicted with the *Natal* trial. As a result, AUSA Richard Schechter joined the team and represented the government at trial with co-counsel AUSA Krishna Patel. The jury convicted the defendants of all charges. The four defendants were sentenced to terms of imprisonment as follows: Zullo, two years; Spaulding, five years; Cari, 30 months; and Miller, four months.

3) United States v. Ziv Hendel, 3:07 Cr. 92 (EBB): In 2007, I represented Ziv Hendel after he was arrested on charges of copyright infringement. During the course of this representation, I appeared in court at the defendant's bail proceedings and ultimately at his guilty plea and sentencing. The case was prosecuted by the USAO in the District of Connecticut and the case was assigned to United States District Court Judge Ellen B. Burns. Mr. Hendel pled guilty to conspiracy to commit criminal copyright infringement and was sentenced to a term of five years of probation.

4) United States v. Ace & Co., Inc., 3:06 Cr 225 (EBB): In 2006, I represented Ace & Co., Inc. in a fraud investigation conducted by the USAO in the District of CT. I appeared in court representing the company at the plea proceeding and at the sentencing before Judge Ellen B. Burns. The Company pled guilty to one count of wire fraud and was sentenced to probation and ordered to pay restitution.

6) United States v. Rita Gluzman, 154 F. 3d 49 (2d Cir. 1998). In 1997, I was co-counsel in the trial of Rita Gluzman, the first murder case to be tried under The Violence Against Women Act. The trial began on April 30, 1997 before Judge Barrington D. Parker, then a United States District Court Judge in the SDNY and now a judge on the Second Circuit Court of Appeals. After a three-week trial, the defendant was convicted of killing and dismembering her husband, and thereafter attempting to evade

responsibility for the crime by disposing of his body parts. At trial on behalf of the Government, I conducted half of the direct and cross examinations and delivered the summation and rebuttal arguments to the jury. The defendant was sentenced to life imprisonment and her conviction was affirmed by the Second Circuit. I did not work on the appeal as I was no longer working in the USAO at the time of the appeal.

8) United States v. Paccione et al., 949 F. 2d 1183 (2d Cir. 1991): In 1989, while an AUSA in the SDNY, I conducted the grand jury investigation that resulted in the indictment of Angelo Paccione, three other individuals and seven entities on racketeering charges relating to the fraudulent operation of a large environmentally hazardous landfill in Staten Island. The case was assigned to United States District Court Judge Constance Baker Motley in the SDNY. I was unable to participate in the trial as it began at the same time our first son was born. Employees were directed to contact me, confidentially and free from retaliation, to report their concerns regarding potential violations of environmental or safety laws. I was authorized to investigate such incidents and had full and free access to all Con Ed employees and facilities, including power plants, work-out locations and street operations, as well as all relevant documents. With such access, I conducted numerous investigations and issued multiple written and oral reports to groups of employees and upper level management. One of the primary goals of the program was to change the culture of the company so that all employees understood the importance of complying with all environmental and safety regulations. Serving as the Independent Monitor during the tenure of two Con Ed Chairmen, I reported directly to the Chairmen, met with them regularly and provided them with my reports and recommendations. By several measures, the company made significant progress in the field of environmental and safety compliance.

Most of these individuals were never charged criminally. Some of them were employees or officers of large corporate entities; others owned or worked at smaller companies.
