Elizabeth (Liza) Goitein co-directs the Brennan Center for Justice’s Liberty and National Security Program, which seeks to advance effective national security policies that respect constitutional values and the rule of law. Before coming to the Brennan Center, Ms. Goitein served as counsel to Senator Feingold, Chairman of the Constitution Subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee, and as a trial attorney in the Federal Programs Branch of the Civil Division of the Department of Justice. Ms. Goitein has authored or co-authored several Brennan Center reports, including *The New Era of Secret Law*, *Overseas Surveillance in an Interconnected World*, *What Went Wrong with the FISA Court*, and *Reducing Overclassification Through Accountability*, as well as the chapter “Lessons from the History of National Security Surveillance” in the forthcoming book *The Cambridge Handbook of Surveillance* and the chapter “Overclassification: Its Causes and Consequences” in the book *An Enduring Tension: Balancing National Security and Our Access to Information*. Her writing also has been featured in major newspapers including *The New York Times*, *Washington Post*, *Wall Street Journal*, *USA Today*, *LA Times*, *Boston Globe*, and *San Francisco Chronicle*. She has testified before the Senate Judiciary Committee and is a frequent commentator on MSNBC and NPR. Ms. Goitein graduated from the Yale Law School and clerked for the Honorable Michael Daly Hawkins on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit.
