### b. Describe:

i. the general character of your law practice and indicate by date when its character has changed over the years.

In 1987, after law school, I worked as an Assistant District Attorney in the New Orleans District Attorney's Office. I served in juvenile court, magistrate court, and the trial division, and as the senior trial attorney in the courts of the Honorable Frank Shea, Dennis Waldron, and Patrick Quinlan. In three years as an assistant district attorney, I prosecuted approximately 75 felony jury trials.

In 1992, I accepted the position of Assistant Federal Public Defender with the Federal Public Defender's Office in the Eastern District of Louisiana. I served as an Assistant Federal Public Defender until 2000 under both Chief Federal Defender Jack Mulvehill and Chief Federal Defender Virginia Schlueter. As counsel on hundreds of federal criminal cases, I worked in all phases of the federal criminal process – pre-trial, trial/plea, and appeal. Due to my Spanish language proficiency, approximately 20% of my caseload involved Spanish-speaking clients.

From 2006 to 2014, I resumed my law practice and worked as a solo practitioner, specializing in criminal trial work in both state and federal court. I was a member of the Criminal Justice Act panel, where I was

regularly assigned conflict cases from the Federal Public Defender's Office. In 2009, I also joined the Capital Defense Project of Southeast Louisiana, where I worked part-time. In this position I maintained two capital cases at all times, and was certified as lead counsel for capital cases in the State of Louisiana.

In 2014, I was appointed as Chief Federal Defender for the Office of the Federal Public Defender, Eastern District of Louisiana. I direct an office of 15 employees, including eight attorneys with approximately 250 open federal criminal cases. I also administer the Criminal Justice Act conflict panel of 100 private attorneys.

As an Assistant District Attorney I represented the State of Louisiana. My clients were the officers of the New Orleans Police Department who made the cases I prosecuted. My clients were also the victims and families of victims who were impacted by crime.

As a Federal Defender, the majority of my clients are indigent and qualify for public defender assistance. Some do not speak English and are not familiar with the American criminal justice system. In contrast, I also have many clients who are veterans of the criminal justice system.

In addition, I have also recently represented police officers charged with assorted state and federal offenses for the Fraternal Order of Police.

My law practice has always required frequent appearances in court. The percentages have changed significantly depending upon the phase of my law career. From 1987 to 1990, as an Assistant District Attorney, I was in court every day for trials, motion hearings or status conferences. My practice then was 100% in state court and was 100% criminal proceedings.

From 1992 to 2000, as an Assistant Federal Defender, I was in court two to three times a week. My practice was 100% in federal court and 100% criminal proceedings.

From 2006 to 2014, as an attorney in private practice, I was in court generally one to two times a week. This was usually for status conferences or motion hearings, as well as the occasional trial. My practice then was approximately 10% civil proceedings and 90% criminal, and approximately 70% in state court and 30% in

federal court.

Currently, as the Chief Federal Defender, I am in court two to three times a week for motion hearings, sentencings, status conferences and the occasional trial. My practice is 100% in federal court and 100% criminal proceedings.

# (3) State of Louisiana v. Wells, Case No. 441-698 K, Criminal District Court for the Parish of Orleans

Mr. Wells was indicted for first degree murder and the state sought the death penalty. This high profile case involved the killing of a popular local restaurateur. After three months of jury selection, which involved individualized sequestered voir dire due to the large amount of media attention, the case proceeded to trial. After a two-week trial in March 2009, the jury was unable to return a verdict and a mistrial was declared. A second trial proceeded nine months later, after another three months of jury selection. Mr. Wells was found guilty of second degree murder and sentenced to life in prison. The second trial was extremely contentious, entailing over a dozen emergency writs to the Louisiana Supreme Court. 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(6) State of Louisiana v. Colclough, Case No. 512-932 "E", Criminal District Court for the Parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana

Mr. Colclough was a New Orleans policeman who shot and killed an unarmed teenager, Mr. Allen, while executing a search warrant on a residence. The district attorney brought the case to the grand jury, and requested a second degree murder indictment, which carries mandatory life in prison. Officer Colclough was indicted for manslaughter, which carries a maximum prison term of 40 years in Louisiana. A change of venue motion was filed and litigated, detailing the dozens of newspaper articles, television reports and community activities about the shooting. In August 2013, the attorney representing the deceased's mother and I arranged a meeting between the Allen family and Officer Colclough. The meeting was filmed by a local television station. Officer Colclough pled guilty, and at the personal request of the victim's mother, received a vastly reduced sentence of four years. The Independent Police Monitor that oversees the actions of the New Orleans Police Department, indicated that it intends to use the handling of this case as a model for resolving police community disputes. I was sole counsel for Officer Colclough. I handled all negotiations and court appearances.

## (8) United States vs. Grant, Case No 96-cr-340 (USDC EDLA 1996)

Mr. Grant was a young man with a sixth grade education who was stopped by the Louisiana State Police while riding as a passenger in a U-Haul truck. Mr. Grant and his co-defendant were placed handcuffed in the back of the trooper's car which was positioned directly behind the U-Haul truck. Unbeknownst to the defendants, the trooper's car had an audio recorder which taped their conversations as they watched the search, which eventually yielded two kilos of cocaine. While the taped conversations appeared to incriminate both defendants as they discussed, the likelihood of the troopers finding the stash, a detailed analysis at the 1997 trial convinced the jury that Mr. Grant did not know where the drugs were hidden. Facing a mandatory minimum of ten years in jail, Mr. Grant was released from custody after the not guilty verdict. I was the sole counsel for Mr. Grant and conducted all aspects of the trial.

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(9) United States v. Sorto-Enamorado, Case No 10-cr-224 (USDC EDLA 2010)

Mr. Sorto-Enamorado was an undocumented alien from Honduras doing construction work in post-Katrina New Orleans. He posted an ad on Craigslist seeking sexual activity with a female. Undercover FBI agents responded to his ad in the guise of a 13-year-old girl. Text and e-mail conversations ensued, culminating in Mr. Sorto-Enamorado's arrest at a hotel room. Mr. Sorto-Enamorado was indicted for using interstate commerce to entice a minor for illegal sexual activity, carrying a mandatory minimum of ten years in jail. The Assistant Federal Public Defender who was originally assigned the case successfully negotiated a deal of five years if Mr. Sorto-Enamorado would plead guilty. He refused the plea offer and asked the court for another attorney. I was assigned the matter through the CJA panel. Mr. Sorto-Enamorado continued to refuse the plea offer and insisted on a trial. Despite a vigorous defense focusing on the defendant's rudimentary English language ability, a jury convicted the defendant at the August 2011 trial. I was the sole counsel for Mr. Sorto-Enamorado. I conducted all aspects of the trial from jury selection through closing arguments.

(10) State of Louisiana v. Cortes, Case No. 486-053, 17th Judicial District Court, Parish of Lafourche, State of Louisiana

Mr. Cortes was a 20-year-old man who had been illegally present in the United States for two months and did not speak a word of English. He worked construction in rural Louisiana. In June 2011, after over 24 hours of drinking, he and three fellow workers left a bar with a local woman for what was initially going to be a paid sexual encounter, but which ultimately resulted in the woman being sexually assaulted by one of the other men and choked to death. All four were arrested within two days and gave confessions in Spanish, without the assistance of an interpreter, to a police officer who had a proficient knowledge of Spanish. All were charged with first degree murder and faced the death penalty. I employed the services of a Spanish interpreter, who discovered that Mr. Cortes had no understanding of his right to counsel and his right to silence. The first step was to eliminate the possibility of death. We finally negotiated a plea agreement of 60 years. I served as co-counsel with Mr. Kerry Cuccia. We shared all investigative duties, client contact, mitigation efforts and negotiations.

The most significant legal activity I have pursued is my daily work as a public defender. A recent significant aspect of my work has been my involvement in our court's re-entry program. Two of our courts in the Eastern District of Louisiana currently have re-entry programs for defendants who have been released from the Bureau of Prisons and are on supervised release with the U.S. Probation office. These programs offer a creative blend of treatment and sanction alternatives to effectively address offender behavior, rehabilitation, and the safety of our community. The goals of this program are to reduce recidivism and promote successful community reintegration while maintaining public safety. I personally staff one of the courts, which involves a weekly meeting with the probation officers, a United States Attorney, a judge and the health care providers. It also involves a weekly court setting with the defendants in the program.

Most recently, I have also worked with the United States Attorney and the Chief Probation Officer in designing a companion program that focuses on offenders preindictment. This new court program, which is scheduled to launch in March 2016, will allow the offenders who successfully complete the program to avoid the lifelong stigma of a felony conviction.
