#### b. Describe:

i. the general character of your law practice and indicate by date when its

character has changed over the years.

From 2002 to 2003, I worked as an Honors Attorney in the Litigation Division, Office of General Counsel at the Central Intelligence Agency. My primary task was protecting Central Intelligence Agency classified information that could be disclosed in litigation. I worked with Department of Justice attorneys and classification experts at the Central Intelligence Agency.

From 2003 to 2005, I served as a criminal division Assistant United States Attorney in Rapid City, South Dakota. I handled all stages of criminal prosecution, including grand jury investigations, pre-trial proceedings, jury and bench trials, and appeals. I primarily prosecuted narcotics violations and violent crime on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, although I also handled a variety of other criminal cases.

From 2005 to 2008, I was an associate at Murphy, Goldammer & Prendergast, LLP, a small law firm in Sioux Falls. I had a general civil litigation practice in federal and state court. I handled a wide range of cases, including personal injury, insurance defense, commercial litigation, constitutional law, and criminal defense. I handled all stages of civil litigation, including drafting pleadings, conducting discovery, drafting and arguing motions, and trial.

In 2008, I transitioned to in-house practice. The character of my practice was different with each employer. From 2008 to 2012, I worked for POET, LLC in Sioux Falls. At POET, I initially managed general litigation. Later, I focused on public policy, regulatory issues, and regulatory litigation. During this time I also served as Special Litigation Counsel for Growth Energy, an ethanol trade organization, where I was lead counsel for the ethanol industry's effort to obtain regulatory approval for 15% ethanol fuel. From 2012 to 2013, I worked as a regulatory attorney at DuPont Pioneer, where I provided legal support for business and regulatory employees seeking to obtain worldwide approval for production and export of genetically engineered seeds and crops. From 2013 to 2014. I worked at Rayen Industries as Director of Corporate Compliance. My primary focus at Raven was providing general compliance for the company's business operations and specifically export compliance for the Aerostar Division's export of defense articles and services.

In 2014, I joined the office of Senator M. Michael Rounds, where I am responsible for all legal, compliance, and ethics issues. I also have a legislative portfolio that includes law enforcement, judicial nominations, civil rights, and immigration. As Deputy Chief of Staff, I managed the Senator's Washington office.

As an Assistant United States Attorney and an attorney for the Central Intelligence Agency, my client was the United States of America. As a prosecutor I specialized in criminal litigation, and at the CIA I specialized in providing support to the Department of Justice to ensure that CIA classified material was protected in litigation.

As in-house counsel, I represented my employers or their related entities, such as POET, LLC, and Growth Energy. The areas I specialized in varied with each employer. At POET, LLC and Growth Energy, I specialized in regulatory issues and regulatory litigation involving the Environmental Protection Agency, the State of California, and several Midwestern states. I also handled political compliance for the POET political action committee and registered lobbyists. At DuPont Pioneer, I provided legal support for DuPont Pioneer's efforts to obtain worldwide regulatory approval for the production and export of genetically engineered agriculture products. At Raven Industries, I worked primarily with the company's Aerostar division to ensure compliance with regulations governing the export of defense articles and services.

In private practice, I worked primarily on civil matters, although I handled a few criminal cases. I represented both plaintiffs and defendants in federal and state court. My clients included a few large corporations, but mostly small businesses, non-profit entities and churches, and individuals.

As an Assistant United States Attorney, I appeared in federal district court multiple times a week. While in private practice, I appeared occasionally in state and federal court. As in-house counsel, I rarely appeared in court.

In this consolidated appeal, the appellants argued that the PROTECT Act, Pub. L. 108-21, 117 Stat. 650 (2003), requires federal district courts to provide notice and a written statement of reasons when revoking supervised release and sentencing a defendant to a term longer than recommended in Chapter 7 of the United States Sentencing Guidelines Manual. The Eighth Circuit (Wollman, Heaney, and Murphy,

JJ.) affirmed the judgments of the district courts. I drafted some of the underlying briefing (there were multiple cases) and argued the consolidated appeal.

3. *United States v. Dale Joseph Martin*, No. 5:03-cr-50075-KES (D.S.D. 2003), 411 F.3d 998 (8th Cir. 2005).

I charged the defendant by criminal complaint and subsequently obtained an indictment for possession with intent to distribute marijuana. The Honorable Karen E. Schreier presided. The defendant entered a conditional plea of guilty and appealed the district court's denial of his motion to suppress. On appeal, the Eighth Circuit (Colloton, Wollman, and Lay, JJ.) affirmed. I drafted the Eighth Circuit brief but did not argue the case for the United States due, to the best of my recollection, to lack of a sufficient travel budget.

The EPA partially granted Growth Energy's waiver application.

After the EPA partially granted Growth Energy's waiver application, I was lead in-house counsel for Growth Energy in *Grocery Manufacturers Association, et al. v. EPA*, a challenge by the petroleum, small engine, and food industries to the partial waiver. Growth Energy intervened in support of the EPA and challenged the petitioners' standing under Article III. Ultimately, a divided panel of the District of Columbia Circuit adopted Growth Energy's arguments and dismissed the petitions for review. *See* 693 F.3d 169 (D.C. Cir. 2012).
