3     **SEC. 201. U.S. CUSTOMS AND BORDER PROTECTION.**

4           In addition to amounts otherwise available, there is  
5 appropriated to the Commissioner of U.S. Customs and  
6 Border Protection for fiscal year 2026, out of any money  
7 in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,  
8 \$13,020,000,000, to remain available until September 30,  
9 2029, for hiring, paying, training, and equipping U.S.  
10 Customs and Border Protection agents, and the necessary  
11 support staff, and to provide other necessary expenses for  
12 U.S. Customs and Border Protection mission support and  
13 operations and maintenance, in order to carry out immi-  
14 gration enforcement activities.

15     **SEC. 202. U.S. IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT.**

16           In addition to amounts otherwise available, there is  
17 appropriated to the Director of U.S. Immigration and  
18 Customs Enforcement for fiscal year 2026, out of any  
19 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,  
20 \$31,075,000,000, to remain available until September 30,  
21 2029, for the following purposes:

22                   (1) **HIRING, PAYING, AND TRAINING.**—Hiring,  
23           paying, training, and equipping U.S. Immigration

1 and Customs Enforcement personnel and the per-  
2 sonnel for all its directorates, including officers,  
3 agents, investigators, attorneys and support staff, to  
4 carry out immigration enforcement activities.

5 (2) TRANSPORTATION.—Funding for transpor-  
6 tation costs and related costs associated with alien  
7 departure or removal operations.

8 (3) INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY.—Funding for  
9 information technology maintenance and  
10 sustainment to support enforcement and removal op-  
11 erations, including improvements to fee collections  
12 and body-worn cameras.

13 (4) FACILITY MAINTENANCE AND  
14 SUSTAINMENT.—Funding for facility maintenance  
15 and sustainment to support enforcement and re-  
16 moval operations.

17 (5) FLEET MAINTENANCE AND  
18 SUSTAINMENT.—Funding for fleet maintenance and  
19 sustainment to support enforcement and removal op-  
20 erations.

21 (6) 287(G) AGREEMENTS.—Supporting coordi-  
22 nation with state and local authorities by expanding,  
23 facilitating, and implementing agreements under sec-  
24 tion 287(g) of the Immigration and Nationality Act  
25 (8 U.S.C. 1357(g)).

1           (7) OFFICE OF THE PRINCIPAL LEGAL ADVI-  
2           SOR.—Hiring and paying attorneys and the nec-  
3           essary support staff within the Office of the Prin-  
4           cipal Legal Advisor to represent the Department in  
5           immigration enforcement and removal proceedings.

6           (8) OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE.—Nec-  
7           essary expenses for U.S. Immigration and Customs  
8           Enforcement’s mission support, including awards,  
9           and operations and maintenance for its immigration  
10          enforcement functions.

11          (9) OPERATIONS BY U.S. IMMIGRATION AND  
12          CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT TO ARREST RELEASED  
13          COVERED UNLAWFUL ALIENS.—

14               (A) IN GENERAL.—Not less than  
15               \$350,000,000 for U.S. Immigration and Cus-  
16               toms Enforcement for necessary expenses, in  
17               accordance with existing law, of detainer man-  
18               agement, detainer issuance, custodial transfer,  
19               release monitoring, transportation, and arrests  
20               of covered unlawful aliens encountered in juris-  
21               dictions that are not qualified cooperating juris-  
22               dictions, except that no Indian tribal govern-  
23               ment shall be treated as a jurisdiction that is  
24               not a qualified cooperating jurisdiction for pur-  
25               poses of this subparagraph.

1 (B) QUALIFIED COOPERATING JURISDIC-  
2 TION DEFINED.—In this paragraph, the term  
3 “qualified cooperating jurisdiction” means a  
4 State or political subdivision of a State that, as  
5 of the date of the enactment of this Act—

6 (i) is party to a written agreement in  
7 effect under section 287(g) of the Immi-  
8 gration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C.  
9 1357(g)); or

10 (ii) has in effect, and has filed with  
11 the Secretary in such form and manner as  
12 the Secretary may prescribe, a certification  
13 that such State or political subdivision is  
14 in compliance with section 642 of the Ille-  
15 gal Immigration Reform and Immigrant  
16 Responsibility Act of 1996 (8 U.S.C.  
17 1373) and section 434 of the Personal Re-  
18 sponsibility and Work Opportunity Rec-  
19 onciliation Act of 1996 (8 U.S.C. 1644).

20 (C) LIMITATION ON USE OF FUNDS.—  
21 None of the funds appropriated pursuant to  
22 this paragraph may be used, except as required  
23 by existing law, to release, parole, place on al-  
24 ternatives to detention, transport for purposes  
25 of release, or otherwise facilitate the release

1 into the community of any covered unlawful  
2 alien encountered.

3 (D) COVERED UNLAWFUL ALIEN DE-  
4 FINED.—In this paragraph, the term “covered  
5 unlawful alien” means an adult alien who—

6 (i) is described in section 236(c)(1) of  
7 the Immigration and Nationality Act (8  
8 U.S.C. 1226(c)(1));

9 (ii) is inadmissible under section  
10 212(a)(2) of such Act (8 U.S.C.  
11 1182(a)(2));

12 (iii) is deportable under section  
13 237(a)(2) of such Act (8 U.S.C.  
14 1227(a)(2));

15 (iv) following an arrest, charge, book-  
16 ing, or conviction for a criminal offense  
17 under Federal, State, or local law, other  
18 than a minor traffic offense, is the subject  
19 of an immigration detainer, notice request,  
20 or custody-transfer request issued by the  
21 Department of Homeland Security pursu-  
22 ant to section 236, 241(a), or 287 of such  
23 Act (8 U.S.C. 1226, 1231(a), or 1357); or

1 (v) has been charged with or convicted  
2 of an offense described in section 275 or  
3 276 of such Act (8 U.S.C. 1325 or 1326).

4 **SEC. 203. ADDITIONAL DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECU-**  
5 **RITY APPROPRIATIONS.**

6 In addition to amounts otherwise available, there is  
7 appropriated to the Secretary of Homeland Security for  
8 fiscal year 2026, out of any money in the Treasury not  
9 otherwise appropriated, \$2,500,000,000, to remain avail-  
10 able until September 30, 2029, for the purposes provided  
11 in this title or in paragraph (3) or (7) of section 100051  
12 of Public Law 119–21.
