#### b. Describe:

i. the general character of your law practice and indicate by date when its character has changed over the years.

From 1991 until 2012, my practice focused on prosecuting state and federal crimes, and included the oversight and management of criminal investigations. During that time period, I also provided ongoing, specialized training and education to law enforcement and prosecutors in the areas of search and seizure, crisis management, electronic surveillance, management of national security investigations, and the Patriot Act.

During my time as a criminal prosecutor, I served in a number of prosecutorial and administrative roles. From 2003 to 2011, I was the designated Crisis Management Coordinator for the United States

Attorney's Office for the Western District, where I was responsible for overseeing the development, training, and reporting of the district's crisis management plans. From 2005 to 2011, I was the Anti-Terrorism Advisory Council Coordinator and Section Chief of the National Security Section, coordinating between the United States Attorney's Office and the FBI's Joint Terrorism Task Force. From 2004 until 2011, I served as the Deputy Chief of the Criminal Division.

As the First Assistant District Attorney, and later as the Deputy Chief of the Criminal Division for the United States Attorney's Office, I was also directly involved in the application and review process for hiring of attorneys and support staff, and the supervision and evaluation of those positions. I was also routinely involved in the mediation of employee issues and the application of relevant employment laws.

From 2011 and continuing at this time, in my capacity as Assistant Dean for Students at the Oklahoma University College of Law, I occasionally speak to groups of law and college students in the areas of criminal law, investigation management, and international terrorism. In my role as an Assistant General Counsel for the University, my work entails civil and administrative matters, and I serve as a consultant in matters involving the potential application of criminal law. I also serve as a consultant to the University's Threat Assessment Review Committee, providing advice to administrators in the area of criminal threat assessment.

As Assistant Dean of Students, I am also responsible for the supervision and evaluation of a number of directors and support staff, and I am sometimes called upon to mediate employee disputes and to provide advice on employment law matters.

For the majority of my career as a District Attorney and Assistant United States Attorney, my client was the public at large. I specialized in prosecuting and overseeing investigations involving drug crimes, violent crimes and homicide, sex crimes, crimes against children, gang prosecution, and national security. I developed particular experience in outlaw motorcycle clubs, electronic surveillance in both Title III and Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act contexts, and complex investigations.

National Security Investigations. As the Anti-Terrorism Advisory Council Coordinator, I served as the lead prosecutor from the United States Attorney's Office for the Western District in all national security matters. I worked daily with the FBI's Joint Terrorism Task Force, serving the directives of the Department of Justice in terrorism investigations. Those investigations were routinely conducted at a classified level, employing a variety of investigative methods requiring my consultation and approval, all in the context of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act, the Patriot Act, various other federal criminal laws, and the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure. My principal roles in working with the agents were to protect the integrity of evidence collected, provide legal advice to ensure the admissibility of evidence in court, and ensure the cases were conducted in accordance with Department of Justice guidelines. In addition, I served on the Suspicious Activity Reports (SAR) Review Committee, a group responsible for the review and analysis of sensitive financial institution reports created in accordance with the Bank Secrecy Act, to identify and investigate activity indicative of potential national security threats. I also trained bank employees regarding SARs and the Bank Secrecy Act.

Operation Bad Luck. This was a federal investigation into a complex and widespread Internet gambling organization based in Panama. I led the investigation for the prosecution with the FBI and other federal law enforcement agencies until I transitioned to my current position as Assistant Dean. Over the course of the case, we employed a variety of investigative techniques, including wiretap surveillance. At the time of my departure, the investigation was substantially complete, with the case proceeding to the indictment stage. The trials are now nearly complete and have all resulted in convictions.

Bombing Investigation. In 2005, a bomb was detonated by an Oklahoma University student, Mr. Hinrichs, during an evening sporting event at the University with approximately 80,000 people in attendance. The device detonated outside the stadium, killing the perpetrator. I was the lead Assistant United States Attorney assigned to work with the investigation. At the time of the bombing, it was unknown whether Hinrichs acted alone or with a terrorist group, intended harm to others, or whether secondary explosive devices were employed. Over the course of 36 hours, I coordinated an intensive and large-scale law enforcement investigation, including the preparation and review of search warrants and other legal processes, as well as interviews and forensic analysis. At the conclusion of the investigation, it was determined that Hinrichs acted alone with the ultimate objective of suicide. Prior to that conclusion, the investigation was a textbook exercise in rapid domestic and national security investigation, as well as crisis management.

## 24. Potential Conflicts of Interest:

I am aware of prior occasions wherein the University of Oklahoma has been a party to civil litigation in federal court in the Western District of Oklahoma. Given my relationship with the University, as well as my spouse's employment at the University, a likely potential conflict of interest exists. I would also have a conflict with criminal cases that arose during the time I served as an Assistant United States Attorney. Due to a financial interest in a bio-technology company called Tetherex (previously Selexys), I would have to address a potential conflict of interest should a case involving the company arise. I would address any potential conflicts in accordance with the Code of Conduct for United States Judges, the established policies of the United States District Court for the Western District of Oklahoma, and all applicable rules regarding ethics and conflicts of interest.

As an Assistant United States Attorney and Assistant District Attorney, pro bono opportunities were limited. During that time, my service to the community included community service projects sponsored by the county bar association (street cleanup, etc.), or serving as the community service representative discussing the government's role in law enforcement.

During my employment at the District Attorney's Office, I served in various positions on the board of the Mary Abbott Children's House, including a term as President. The organization took a multidisciplinary approach to providing services to abused children and their families.

As an Assistant Dean at the College of Law, my responsibilities include the education of, and emphasis of pro bono work to, a law student body of over 500 students. I meet regularly with students individually and collectively to counsel them on pro bono opportunities, ethical and legal perspectives for these roles, and their implementation. Pro bono opportunities require financial support, and I coordinate and identify these opportunities and secure funding for the projects.

I also currently serve as the College of Law's delegate to the Oklahoma Access to Justice Commission. The commission is charged with addressing the problems of access to legal representation on civil legal matters to low-income Oklahomans.

I am not aware of a selection commission in my jurisdiction. On May 18, 2015, a representative of Senator James Lankford's office contacted me by email and advised me that my name had been provided to the Senator as a potential candidate to fill a judicial vacancy in the Western District of Oklahoma. On May 27, 2015, I interviewed with Senator Lankford and a staff member in his Oklahoma City office. I was subsequently nominated and appeared before the Senate Judiciary Committee at a hearing on April 20, 2016. My nomination expired before I was confirmed. In approximately early December 2016, Senator Lankford contacted me by telephone and advised me that he intended to resubmit my name to the White House for consideration. On December 12, 2016, I received a phone call and email message from a member of Senator James Inhofe's staff, advising me Senator Inhofe was also planning to resubmit my

name to the White House for consideration. During the weeks after that call, I remained in contact with staff members of both Senator Lankford and Senator Inhofe.

Since the week of February 21, 2017, I have been in contact with officials from the White House Counsel's Office. On March 10, 2017, I interviewed with attorneys from the White House Counsel's Office and the Office of Legal Policy at the Department of Justice in Washington, DC.
