The Knights of Columbus is a Catholic fraternal organization limited to men, although there is a corresponding organization for women. Pi Kappa Alpha is a fraternity that, prior to 1964, restricted its membership to white men. To the best of my knowledge, none of the other organizations listed above currently discriminates or formerly discriminated on the basis of race, sex, religion or national origin, either through formal membership requirements or the practical implementation of membership policies.

Since the late 1980s, when handling employment and labor cases, the vast majority of my clients have been corporate clients. However, I have represented a number of individuals with regard to employment related matters. Formerly, I represented insurance companies in insurance defense matters and a limited number of individual plaintiffs in personal injury cases.

During my first few years of practice, I handled primarily personal injury/insurance defense claims which allowed me to be in court and try cases frequently. Since the mid-1980s, I have handled numerous employment-related lawsuits. While the number of matters that have actually gone to trial over the last few years has decreased significantly, I nonetheless continue to spend time in state and federal courts dealing with these matters. In federal court, virtually all of the submissions (short of trial) are written and not oral. Therefore, I am frequently involved in the written submission to the federal courts at all stages of litigation, including pleadings, discovery motions, evidentiary motions, and dispositive motions. Early in my career, I handled a limited number of criminal matters, and I have been involved in a number of civil lawsuits that also involved criminal issues.

I represented defendant First State Bank in this matter. Plaintiff brought an action under 42 U.S.C. § 1983 against a private bank in Loomis, Nebraska. Plaintiff claimed that defendant bank conspired with the Loomis State School District to terminate plaintiff's employment in retaliation for plaintiff exercising her constitutional right of freedom of speech at a public school board meeting. The matter was first tried in 2003. The first trial resulted in a jury verdict in favor of plaintiff in the amount of \$1,555,678. I was not involved in the first trial. The court granted a motion for new trial and a second trial was held in 2003. The second trial, in which I became involved as co-lead counsel, resulted in a verdict in favor of defendant. The matter was appealed to the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals, which ordered retrial based upon a single jury instruction. 399 F.3d 940 (8th Cir. 2005). The third trial was held in 2005. I again acted as co-lead counsel. The third trial resulted in another verdict in favor of defendant. No appeal was taken. The case is significant because it involved an issue of first impression relating to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 and the First Amendment and the liability of a private employer based upon its actions involving governmental entities.

3. *Foltz v. Northwestern Bell*, 376 N.W.2d 301 (Neb. 1985), filed 1984, closed 1985, before the Honorable James Buckley, District Court of Douglas County, Nebraska.

In this case, my partner Joseph Meusey and I represented defendant Northwestern Bell Telephone Company in a lawsuit brought by Mr. Foltz on behalf of his son, T. Foltz. The lawsuit was also brought against Coen Construction Company. T. Foltz was on a tractor mowing ditches in a rural area. While mowing the ditch, his tractor wheel ran up on a telephone pole that had been cut off and was hidden in the tall grass. As a result of this, T. Foltz was thrown from the tractor and the mower blade cut off his heel. Northwestern Bell had contracted with Coen Construction to remove old telephone poles in the area. The jury returned a verdict for both Northwestern Bell and Coen. The decision of the jury and the court was affirmed on appeal by the Nebraska Supreme Court. 376 N.W.2d 301 (Neb. 1985). The case is significant in that the Nebraska Supreme Court's discussion and holding with respect to premises liability has been critical to the development of Nebraska law since that time and has not been reversed or modified. This case has been cited by more than 20 Nebraska Supreme Court or intermediate appellate court decisions since that time.

4. *Fred v. Wackenhut Corp.*, 860 F. Supp. 1401 (D. Neb. 1994), *aff'd*, 53 F.2d 335 (8th Cir. 1995), filed November 1990, closed June 1994, before the Honorable Lyle Strom, United States District Court of Nebraska.

I represented defendant Omaha Public Power District (OPPD) as sole counsel in this matter. This was a Title VII sexual harassment case. Plaintiff was a female guard at OPPD's Fort Calhoun Nuclear Power Station. The case was significant given the number and types of sexual harassment claims. The non-jury trial spanned over three weeks and resulted in a judgment in favor of defendant. 860 F. Supp. 1401 (D. Neb. 1994). The case was appealed to the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals, which affirmed the decision of the district court. 53 F.3d 335 (8th Cir. 1995).

5. *Jaramillo v. Burkhart*, Case Nos. 8:87-CV-00508 & 8:87-CV-00509, *aff'd*, 985 F.2d 567 (8th Cir. 1991), filed July 1987, closed February 1996, before the Honorable William G. Cambridge (deceased), United States District Court of Nebraska.

In this matter, I represented defendant Mr. Burkhart, the driver of a truck involved in a tragic automobile accident in 1986. Ms. Jaramillo was a passenger in an automobile driven by Mr. Nava. Two children of Ms. Jaramillo were back seat passengers. Ms. Jaramillo's vehicle was hit by a truck owned by Olsen Brothers, Inc. and driven by Mr. Burkhart, an employee of Olsen Brothers. As a result of the accident, Ms. Jaramillo and Mr. Nava died, and the two children were injured. The lawsuit was tried before a jury in front of the late Hon. William G. Cambridge, and the jury found in favor of defendant Mr. Burkhart. That jury's verdict was affirmed in an unpublished opinion by the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals. 985 F.2d 567 (8th Cir. 1991). After the Eighth Circuit held in a later appeal that the district court lacked discretion to deny a motion to amend to join Mr. Nava as a real party in interest, the matter was settled. 59 F.3d 78 (8th Cir. 1995). This matter was significant as it dealt with a number of tort and comparative negligence issues.

7. *Jones v. Tek Industries*, 319 F.3d 355 (8th Cir. 2003), filed April 2000, closed March 2001, before the Honorable Warren Urbom, United States District Court of Nebraska.

I represented the defendant, a private manufacturing company, in this matter. This case involved a Title VII claim of religious discrimination brought by several inmates at the Nebraska State Penitentiary. Those inmates worked for the defendant within the walls of the prison. The issue related to religious accommodation and whether plaintiff's belief in the teachings of the "House of Yahweh" should be accommodated in a prison workplace. The matter was tried to a jury for a week, and a defendant's verdict was returned. The matter was appealed to the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals, and the verdict was upheld on appeal. 319 F.3d 355 (8th Cir. 2003). The case is significant given the variety of religious accommodation issues raised.

8. *Rains v. Becton, Dickinson and Co.*, 523 N.W.2d 506 (Neb. 1994), filed 1993, closed 1994, before the Honorable Robert Steinke, District Court of Platte County, Nebraska.

In this case, I represented Becton, Dickinson and Co. in a wrongful termination lawsuit brought by Ms. Rains. Ms. Rains claimed that her termination, for falling asleep on the job, was wrongful, and that she was entitled to protections of the company handbook. The matter was tried to the court, which found in favor of Becton, Dickinson and Co. The matter was affirmed on appeal before the Nebraska Supreme Court. 523 N.W.2d 506 (Neb. 1994). The matter is significant in that it is an early case clarifying the doctrine of employment at will and the use of handbook language in supporting such a claim. The case has been cited more

9. *Sahulka v. Lucent Technologies, Inc.*, Case No. 8:94-CV-00527, filed October 1994, closed November 1995, before the Honorable William G. Cambridge (deceased), United States District Court of Nebraska.

I represented the defendant manufacturer as sole counsel in this matter. This was the first case litigated in the District of Nebraska and one of the first in the country under the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA). The case, which was eventually tried before the late Hon. William G. Cambridge, involved an employee of defendant who had a number of medical issues. The plaintiff had been terminated for violations of attendance rules. The plaintiff also had an adult son with schizophrenia who lived at home with the plaintiff. The primary issue in the case was whether the company knew or should have known that FMLA leave should have been offered to the plaintiff. Judge Cambridge eventually found in favor of the plaintiff and reinstated her, but limited damages. No appeal was taken from this matter. There is no reported decision.

10. *Wilson v. US West Communications*, 860 F. Supp. 665 (1995); *aff'd*, 58 F.3d 1337 (8th Cir. 1995), filed April 1993, closed November 1995, before the Honorable Thomas Shanahan (deceased), United States District Court of Nebraska.

I represented defendant US West Communications as sole counsel in this matter. This religious discrimination case was brought under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The case received a great deal of press coverage. The plaintiff, Ms. Wilson, a longtime employee of US West Communications, began wearing a button to work that depicted an aborted fetus and urged the elimination of all abortions. Ms. Wilson testified that as a Roman Catholic, she had made a promise to the Blessed Virgin Mary that she would wear the button at all times until abortion ended. The issue was whether US West Communications, offering several alternatives to Wilson, had met its obligation of accommodation under Title VII. The court found that US West had met its obligations and granted judgment for the employer. 860 F. Supp. 665 (1995). The matter was appealed to the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals, which affirmed the decision of the district court. 58 F.3d

1337 (8th Cir. 1995). The case is significant given the religious discrimination and accommodation issues raised and the context in which they were raised. It has been cited more than 45 times in cases and in numerous secondary sources.
