3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Justice Against Spon-
5	sors of Terrorism Act".
6	SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.
7	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
8	(1) International terrorism is a serious and
9	deadly problem that threatens the vital interests of
10	the United States.
11	(2) The Constitution confers upon Congress the
12	power to punish crimes against the law of nations

and therefore Congress may by law impose penalties on those who provide material support to foreign organizations engaged in terrorist activity, and allow for victims of international terrorism to recover damages from those who have harmed them.

- (3) International terrorism affects the interstate and foreign commerce of the United States by harming international trade and market stability, and limiting international travel by United States citizens as well as foreign visitors to the United States.
- (4) Some foreign terrorist organizations, acting through affiliated groups or individuals, raise significant funds outside of the United States for conduct directed and targeted at the United States.
- (5) It is necessary to recognize the substantive causes of action for aiding and abetting and conspiracy liability under the Anti-Terrorism Act of 1987 (22 U.S.C. 5201 et seq.), especially given that the United States Courts of Appeals for the 2d and 7th Circuits have held that such theories of liability currently are not available. See Rothstein v. UBS AG, 708 F.3d 82 (2d Cir. 2013); Boim v. Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development, 549 F.3d 685 (7th Cir. 2008) (en banc).

3 1 (6) The decision of the United States Court of 2 Appeals for the District of Columbia in Halberstam 3 v. Welch, 705 F.2d 472 (D.C. Cir. 1983), which has 4 been widely recognized as the leading case regarding 5 federal civil aiding and abetting and conspiracy li-6 ability, including by the Supreme Court of the 7 United States, provides the proper legal framework 8 for how such liability should function in the context 9 of the Anti-Terrorism Act of 1987 (22 U.S.C. 5201 10 et seq.). 11 (7) The United Nations Security Council de-12 clared in Resolution 1373, adopted on September 13 28, 2001, that all countries have an affirmative obli-14 gation to "[r]efrain from providing any form of sup-15 port, active or passive, to entities or persons involved in terrorist acts," and to "[e]nsure that any person 16

who participates in the financing, planning, prepara-

tion or perpetration of terrorist acts or in supporting

19 terrorist acts is brought to justice".

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- (8) Consistent with these declarations, no country has the discretion to engage knowingly in the financing or sponsorship of terrorism, whether directly or indirectly.
- (9) Persons, entities, or countries that knowingly or recklessly contribute material support or re-

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sources, directly or indirectly, to persons or organizations that pose a significant risk of committing acts of terrorism that threaten the security of nationals of the United States or the national security, foreign policy, or economy of the United States, necessarily direct their conduct at the United States, and should reasonably anticipate being brought to court in the United States to answer for such activities.

(10) The United States has a vital interest in providing persons and entities injured as a result of terrorist attacks committed within the United States with full access to the court system in order to pursue civil claims against persons, entities, or countries that have knowingly or recklessly provided material support or resources, directly or indirectly, to the persons or organizations responsible for their injuries.

19 (b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to provide 20 civil litigants with the broadest possible basis, consistent 21 with the Constitution of the United States, to seek relief 22 against persons, entities, and foreign countries, wherever 23 acting and wherever they may be found, that have pro-24 vided material support, directly or indirectly, to foreign

1 organizations or persons that engage in terrorist activities

2 against the United States.

3 SEC. 3. FOREIGN SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY.

4 Section 1605(a) of title 28, United States Code, is

5 amended—

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6 (1) by amending paragraph (5) to read as follows:

"(5) not otherwise encompassed in paragraph (2), in which money damages are sought against a foreign state arising out of physical injury or death, or damage to or loss of property, occurring in the United States and caused by the tortious act or omission of that foreign state or of any official or employee of that foreign state while acting within the scope of the office or employment of the official or employee (regardless of where the underlying tortious act or omission occurs), including any statutory or common law tort claim arising out of an act

contribution or indemnity relating to a claim arising

of extrajudicial killing, aircraft sabotage, hostage

taking, terrorism, or the provision of material sup-

port or resources for such an act, or any claim for

out of such an act, except this paragraph shall not

24 apply to—

1	"(A) any claim based upon the exercise or
2	performance of, or the failure to exercise or
3	perform, a discretionary function, regardless of
4	whether the discretion is abused; or
5	"(B) any claim arising out of malicious
6	prosecution, abuse of process, libel, slander,

14	"(e) Definitions.—For purposes of subsection
15	(a)(5)—
16	"(1) the terms 'aircraft sabotage', 'extrajudicial
17	killing', 'hostage taking', and 'material support or
18	resources' have the meanings given those terms in
19	section 1605A(h); and
20	"(2) the term 'terrorism' means international
21	terrorism and domestic terrorism, as those terms are
22	defined in section 2331 of title 18.".

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	SEC. 4.	AIDING AN	ND ABETTING	LIABILITY	FOR CIVIL	AC-

- 2 TIONS REGARDING TERRORIST ACTS.
- 3 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 2333 of title 18, United
- 4 States Code, is amended by adding at the end the fol-
- 5 lowing:
- 6 "(d) Liability.—In an action under subsection (a)
- 7 for an injury arising from an act of international terrorism
- 8 committed, planned, or authorized by an organization that
- 9 had been designated as a foreign terrorist organization
- 10 under section 219 of the Immigration and Nationality Act
- 11 (8 U.S.C. 1189), as of the date on which such act of inter-
- 12 national terrorism was committed, planned, or authorized,
- 13 or that was so designated as a result of such act of inter-
- 14 national terrorism, liability may be asserted as to any per-
- 15 son or entity that aided, abetted, or conspired with the
- 16 person who committed such an act of international ter-
- 17 rorism.
- 18 "(e) Non-applicability of Law of Pre-
- 19 CLUSION.—Any civil action or claim that seeks recovery
- 20 under this chapter for conduct that was the basis of a
- 21 civil action or claim previously dismissed for lack of sub-
- 22 ject matter jurisdiction for failure to meet the require-
- 23 ments for an exception under section 1605(a) of title 28
- 24 is not subject to dismissal under the law of preclusion.".

- 4 SEC. 5. PERSONAL JURISDICTION FOR CIVIL ACTIONS RE-
- 5 GARDING TERRORIST ACTS.
- 6 Section 2334 of title 18, United States Code, is
- 7 amended by inserting at the end the following:
- 8 "(e) Personal Jurisdiction.—The district courts
- 9 shall have personal jurisdiction, to the maximum extent
- 10 permissible under the 5th Amendment to the Constitution
- 11 of the United States, over any person who commits, aids
- 12 and abets an act of international terrorism, or otherwise
- 13 sponsors such act or the person who committed such act,
- 14 for acts of international terrorism in which any national
- 15 of the United States suffers injury in his or her person,
- 16 property, or business by reason of such an act in violation
- 17 of section 2333.".
- 18 SEC. 6. LIABILITY FOR GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS IN CIVIL
- 19 ACTIONS REGARDING TERRORIST ACTS.
- Section 2337 of title 18, United States Code, is
- 21 amended to read as follows:

- "No action may be maintained under section 2333
