Nomination of J. Nicholas Ranjan United States District Court For the Western District of Pennsylvania Statement for the Record Submitted by Senator Pat Toomey (R-PA) November 13, 2018

I am grateful to Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Chuck Grassley (R-IA) and Ranking Member Diane Feinstein (D-CA) for holding a nomination hearing for my fellow Pennsylvanian J. Nicholas Ranjan, who has been nominated to serve on the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Pennsylvania. I enthusiastically support Mr. Ranjan's nomination.

I am also grateful to my colleague Senator Bob Casey (D-PA) for his long-standing collaboration in working to fill federal district court vacancies in Pennsylvania. For the past eight years, Senator Casey and I have worked together, in bipartisan fashion, to fill vacancies on the federal bench in our home state. Together, we have vetted, recommended, and confirmed 18 federal district court judges. Mr. Ranjan has an impressive set of legal credentials that will make him an excellent judge. He is currently a litigation partner in the Pittsburgh office of K&L Gates LLP, a leading global law firm, where he has practiced since 2005. During his career, he has appeared in federal and state courts in Pennsylvania and beyond and represented clients in complex litigation matters, including commercial, energy, and appellate disputes. He has been recognized by Chambers USA as one of the top commercial litigators in Pennsylvania multiple times.

Prior to joining K&L Gates, Mr. Ranjan clerked for Judge Deborah Cook of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit and served as a Simon Karas Fellow with the Ohio Attorney General's office, working with Ohio's Solicitor General on major appeals. Mr. Ranjan attended the University of Michigan Law School, where he graduated *cum laude*, and Grove City College, where he graduated *summa cum laude*.

Throughout his career, Mr. Ranjan has provided pro bono legal services to the disadvantaged, including prisoners and criminal defendants, and has been repeatedly recognized for this work.
