I began my legal career as an Assistant Corporation Counsel for the City of New York (2001-2005) where my practice consisted exclusively of civil litigation before the U.S. District Courts for the Southern and Eastern Districts of New York. For the past sixteen years, I have served as an Assistant United States Attorney (AUSA) in three U.S. Attorney's offices. I joined the Justice Department in 2005 as an AUSA in the Eastern District of New York (Brooklyn), transferred in 2008 to the District of Massachusetts, and in December 2013 to the District of Rhode Island. I have been formally assigned to the Civil Division in all three offices. As an attorney for the government, my practice is primarily civil in nature and consists of a mixture of affirmative litigation in which the United States is plaintiff (principally under the False Claims Act); and defensive litigation in which the government, its agencies, or its officers are sued as defendants on a wide array of claims. In my current role as Chief of the Civil Division (and in prior management roles in Boston), I also supervise and mentor a team of attorneys and support staff, and counsel and advise the U.S. Attorney as a member of the Office's management team.

As an AUSA in both Rhode Island and Massachusetts, I have also been cross-designated to the Criminal Division by the United States Attorney, and in that capacity have also worked on a number of criminal cases including health care fraud, violations of the Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, mail and wire fraud, violations of the Anti-Kickback Statute, controlled substance offenses, possession of a firearm by a felon, and false statements to a federal officer.

As an Assistant Corporation Counsel, I represented the City of New York and its agencies, officers, and officials in litigation in federal court. As an Assistant United States Attorney in the Eastern District of New York, I represented federal agencies in affirmative and defensive litigation in federal district court and on appeal; my work as an AUSA in the District of Massachusetts and the District of Rhode Island has been similar, and has also involved criminal prosecutions on behalf of

the United States, largely but not exclusively related to health care fraud.
